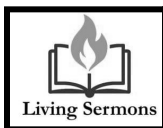

Scripture Reading

Deuteronomy 8:18 (KJV)

"But thou shalt remember the LORD thy God: for it is he that giveth thee power to get wealth, that he may establish his covenant which he sware unto thy fathers, as it is this day."

Today is more like a school, so you may be doing a lot of writing.

Anything you write down controls you. Once you put something down and return to it later, it gives you direction. It is powerful.

A survey was conducted at Harvard University, and they discovered that a significant percentage of those who became successful were people who had written down, while they were students, what they wanted to become. When you write something down, it has the power to guide and direct you.

That is why it is called *spelling*. It carries a kind of control. A spell controls. When you cast a spell on someone, you control them. In the same way, when you are spelling, you are exercising a form of control over direction and focus.

Our anchor scripture says:

"But thou shalt remember the LORD thy God: for it is he that giveth thee power to get wealth..."

As we study this scripture, certain fundamental truths begin to emerge.

What Is Power?

To understand this verse properly, we must first understand what power is.

Power is:

- Ability
- Advantage
- Enablement
- Capacity
- Leverage
- Influence
- Opportunity
- Might
- Capability

Power is a relative word.

In mathematics, power is exponential multiplication—when something multiplies itself. The Bible says God gives power, which means He gives ability, opportunity, advantage, capacity, and influence.

But over the years, in more than thirty-seven years of carrying the Bible, I have noticed that many people do not know what wealth truly is.

The Four Kinds of Wealth

When people hear the word *wealth*, the first thing that comes to mind is money.

Yet paper money—cash—is actually the lowest level of wealth.

There are four kinds of wealth.

1. Status Wealth

There are people who have money, yet people do not respect them. You cannot truly call that wealth. Status wealth is when a person is conscious of integrity.

Integrity is a currency stronger than cash. There are families today with enormous wealth, yet people will not allow their children to marry into those families because the family has no honourable reputation.

Status wealth is when people hear your name and say:

"That is a good family."

Many families possess wealth, but nobody can trace how it was acquired. Consequently, people keep their distance. A good man deliberately lives with legacy in mind.

Proverbs 13:22 (KJV) says:

"A good man leaveth an inheritance to his children's children."

An inheritance is not merely money. It includes reputation, honour, and character. That is status wealth.

2. Health Wealth

A man may have no money in his pocket and yet be healthy. There are financially rich people today who carry drugs everywhere they go.

That is not wealth.

When you properly understand wealth, you will realise that any area of deficiency diminishes true wealth. Many people do not realise how wealthy they are because they focus only on money.

You may not have much cash, but you are healthy. There are billionaires who cannot live without medication, injections, and constant medical attention. You cannot call such a person completely wealthy because there is deficiency in health.

3. Time Wealth

Time wealth is the abundance of meaningful time. It is the memories you create with people who matter. Many people remember their parents, not because of money, but because of moments. How often have you heard someone say:

"My father used to say..."

"My mother used to do..."

Those memories are a form of wealth. Wealth goes far beyond tangible possessions. When you reduce wealth to tangible things alone, you make a mockery of its true meaning.

4. Financial Wealth

This is money. Of course, money is important, but it is the lowest rung on the ladder. Many people who never stepped into the corridors of formal institutions possess money.

Money alone does not define wealth.

What Is Wealth?

Wealth is an abundance of valuables. Wealth is the sum total of assets and resources minus debt. A debtor cannot genuinely claim to be wealthy.

Proverbs 22:7 (KJV) says:

"The rich ruleth over the poor, and the borrower is servant to the lender."

Every time you borrow, you are prophesying servanthood. Borrowing places you under another person's control. When you understand the trap of debt, you will run from it.

Borrowing is slavery.

What is debt?

Debt is using tomorrow's ability to pay for today's liabilities. Debt is spending ahead of time. The very word *debt* can be understood as desiring enjoyment before time. Desperate enjoyment always brings trouble. No matter what you are facing today, it is better to live within your means than to enjoy a borrowed lifestyle. Many people today are living on borrowed lives, borrowed clothes, borrowed hair, borrowed shoes, and borrowed appearances. Meanwhile, they already possess something sufficient that they can manage. You have enough more often than you realise.

Wealth Is More Than Cash

Paper money is the lowest level of wealth. Wealth is the multiplication of:

- Influence
- Affluence
- Opulence

Many people limit wealth to physical possessions. Yet character itself is wealth. Your consciousness of eternity is wealth.

Eternal Life Is Wealth

After Jesus preached, many people left Him. Then He turned to His disciples.

John 6:68 (KJV) says:

"Then Simon Peter answered him, Lord, to whom shall we go? thou hast the words of eternal life."

Notice Peter did not say, *"Where shall we go?"*

He said:

"To whom shall we go?"

Destiny is not merely a place. Destiny is ultimately found in a Person. When we find Him, He takes us where we ought to be. Your greatest wealth is eternal life. Your consciousness of eternal life empowers every other dimension of wealth.

Say:

"I am wealthy. I have God. I have character. I have a sound mind. I am wealthy."

The Gospel Is Power

Romans 1:16 (KJV) says:

"For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation..."

The gospel is power.

If we are going to understand wealth, we must understand the gospel because the gospel itself is power.

Every time you engage the gospel, you access power.

Whenever people become hungry for God's Word, God manifests Himself. God always appears through His Word. God appears where His Word is valued.

Luke 5:1 (KJV) records that people pressed upon Jesus to hear the Word of God. Whenever people place pressure on the Word, they experience pleasure in life.

Key Number One: Seek God

Returning to Deuteronomy 8:18:

"But thou shalt remember the LORD thy God..."

The first key to wealth is seeking God. If you must enjoy true wealth, you must seek God.

Matthew 6:33 (KJV) says:

"But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you."

What are "all these things"?

Your daily needs. God promises to meet your daily needs.

Psalms 34:10 (KJV) says:

"The young lions do lack, and suffer hunger: but they that seek the LORD shall not want any good thing."

Notice the promise.

Not *everything*.

But *every good thing*.

Any time you are genuinely seeking God and something is absent from your life, it is because God knows it is not good for you at that moment.

If it were good for you, God would bring it. If a car is absent, He knows what that car might attract. If a house is absent, He knows what responsibilities accompany it. If marriage is delayed, He knows what preparation is still necessary.

The Bible says:

"No good thing will he withhold..."

Therefore, if it is not present, trust His wisdom.

Tell somebody:

"Seek the Lord."

What Does It Mean to Seek God?

Psalm 27:8 (KJV) says:

"When thou saidst, Seek ye my face; my heart said unto thee, Thy face, LORD, will I seek."

Psalm 24:6 (KJV) says:

"This is the generation of them that seek him, that seek thy face..."

Seeking God means pursuing Him passionately. It means engaging His thoughts and His ways.

Isaiah 55:6–8 (KJV) teaches that God's thoughts are higher than our thoughts and His ways higher than our ways. Seeking God means aligning yourself with how God thinks and how God acts. The thoughts of God produce the ways of God.

When a man thinks like God, he begins to walk like God.

Psalm 103:7 (KJV) says:

"He made known his ways unto Moses, his acts unto the children of Israel."

When you understand God's ways, you experience His acts. Seeking God means intimacy with Him. It means prioritising God in your daily pursuits. It means allowing God's agenda to become your agenda.

The Evidence of Seeking God

2 Chronicles 7:14 (KJV) says:

"If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face..."

One of the clearest evidences of seeking God is turning away from your own ways.

The proof of genuine pursuit is:

"Not my will, but Thy will be done."

Seeking God is not merely spending time in church. A person can sleep in church and still miss God. Being present in a church building does not automatically make someone spiritual. Just because someone visits a mechanic's workshop does not make them a car.

Likewise, being around spiritual activities does not automatically produce spiritual transformation. True seekers align their lives with God's will. The essence of seeking God is surrender. When your will is abandoned for His will, your pursuit becomes genuine.

God's Leading Produces God's Feeding

In Deuteronomy 8, we discover two powerful truths.

God led Israel.

God fed Israel.

Deuteronomy 8:15–16 (KJV) reveals both realities.

God's feeding is found in His leading. If God cannot lead you, He cannot feed you. If God can lead you:

- Provision becomes reality.
- Supply becomes constant.
- Multiplication becomes normal.
- Enlargement becomes evident.
- Increase becomes natural.
- Expansion follows naturally.

God's leading is the pathway to divine provision.

Romans 8:14 (KJV) says:

"For as many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God."

Seek God to access wealth.

Key Number Two: Covenant

Returning again to Deuteronomy 8:18:

"...that he may establish his covenant..."

The second key to wealth is covenant. Covenant is simply an agreement established upon clearly defined terms.

Marriage is a covenant.

Deep friendship can grow into covenant.

God is a covenant-keeping God.

Psalm 89:34 (KJV) says:

"My covenant will I not break, nor alter the thing that is gone out of my lips."

God spoke concerning David and declared that His covenant would stand. God does not break covenant. Covenant means there is God's part and there is man's part.

Daniel 11:32 (KJV) says:

"...but the people that do know their God shall be strong, and do exploits."

Those who truly know God are covenant keepers. Many people misunderstand grace and conclude that covenant responsibilities no longer exist. That is not correct.

Jesus paid the price for our redemption. However, believers still have responsibilities. Jesus will not study your books for you. Jesus will not take your examinations for you.

Jesus will not pay your landlord for you. Jesus will not do your assignments for you. The grace of God empowers responsibility; it does not eliminate responsibility. The believer must still walk in love, obey God's instructions, and honour covenant obligations.

It is your responsibility. Christ has done His part, but there are responsibilities that remain ours. I want to ask you a question. Are you not too mature as a Christian to still be arguing about tithing?

People say, "Tithing is under the law."

Says who?

That statement reveals a lack of proper scriptural understanding. Tithing was not born under the law; it was incorporated into the law. Abraham paid tithes long before Moses.

Was Abraham under the law?

Of course not. Many people assume that everything in the Old Testament automatically belongs to the Law of Moses. That is not correct. The Mosaic covenant began with Moses.

Before Moses, there were different dispensations through which God related with humanity.

The Seven Dispensations

1. The Dispensation of Innocence – Adam before the fall.
2. The Dispensation of Conscience – From the fall to the flood.
3. The Dispensation of Human Government – After Noah's flood.
4. The Dispensation of Promise – Abraham.
5. The Dispensation of Law – Moses.
6. The Dispensation of Grace – Beginning in Acts chapter 2.
7. The Millennial Kingdom – Christ's future reign on earth.

Abraham lived under promise, not under the law. The law came approximately four hundred and thirty years after Abraham.

Noah was called a preacher of righteousness. Righteousness points to Christ. Abraham demonstrated prophetically what Christ would later accomplish. When God instructed Abraham to offer Isaac, it was a picture of the Father offering His Son. When God stopped Abraham and provided a ram, He was revealing Christ, the sacrificial Lamb.

Likewise, Noah's ark was a picture of Christ. The ark had one door.

Genesis 6:16 (KJV) records the single entrance.

John 10:9 (KJV) says:

"I am the door..."

Just as there was one door into the ark, there is one way into salvation. Therefore, many practices that existed before Moses were later incorporated into the Law.

Tithing was one of them.

Tithing and the Heart of God

One reason I rarely teach extensively on tithing is because the subject has become corrupted. Many people now see tithing as a transaction.

That was never God's intention. Tithing was designed to cultivate selflessness and destroy materialism. God connects giving with justice, mercy, love, and responsibility.

Luke 11:42 (NLT) says:

"Yes, you should tithe, but do not neglect the more important things."

Jesus did not abolish tithing. He placed it in its proper context.

The greater matters were:

- Justice
- Love
- Mercy
- Equity

God never intended giving to become a business arrangement. You do not give because you are trying to buy a miracle. You do not tithe because you want God to become your business partner. God is far greater than that.

Giving is an act of worship. Giving is an expression of selflessness. One of the strongest evidences of selflessness is generosity.

Knowing the Bible and Knowing Scripture

Many people know the Bible, but they do not know Scripture. The Bible is a collection of sixty-six books.

Scriptural understanding involves discovering the original intent behind what was written. Every translation is, in some measure, a step-down version of the original expression. Just as electrical power must pass through a transformer before entering a house, translations communicate truths that originated in Hebrew, Aramaic, and Greek.

This is why serious study is important. Scripture must never be reduced to mere historical storytelling. The truths of Scripture remain relevant because God's principles remain relevant.

Giving Is Worship, Not Transaction

One of the dangers in modern Christianity is transactional thinking.

People say:

"I paid my tithe, but nothing happened."

That reveals a misunderstanding of worship.

You do not tithe so something can happen.

You tithe because God deserves honour.

You do not give because you are demanding a return.

You give because you love God.

Those who truly understand God are rarely discouraged.

Why?

Because they understand that answers are already released.

As they continue walking with God, those answers manifest in due season.

Walk Before Me

Genesis 15:1 (KJV) says:

"Fear not, Abram: I am thy shield, and thy exceeding great reward."

Then in **Genesis 17:1 (KJV)** God said:

"Walk before me, and be thou perfect."

Why the change?

Because Abraham had begun looking at circumstances.

He was wondering whether Eliezer would become his heir.

God was reminding him:

"Walk before Me."

When you are truly walking with God, your focus remains on Him.

Perfection is sustained attention upon God.

You cannot focus on God and focus on fear at the same time.

You cannot claim to be looking up to God while your confidence is anchored elsewhere.

Covenant demands focus.

Covenant demands trust.

The Foundation of Covenant Is Selflessness

The trigger of covenant is selflessness. Until you understand selflessness, many spiritual principles will remain distorted. Every covenant relationship requires sacrifice.

Every covenant relationship requires putting God's will above personal gain. When people discuss money, many approach Scripture from the wrong perspective. The primary message of the Bible is not wealth accumulation.

The central message of Scripture is loving God and loving people. Repeatedly, Jesus emphasised generosity, sacrifice, compassion, and service. He continually taught people to release rather than hoard.

The focus of Christ was always the heart.

The Power of Selflessness

One of the greatest examples of selflessness is found in the life of John D. Rockefeller. As a young man, he became extraordinarily wealthy. Yet in his early forties, he developed severe health complications. Doctors predicted he had only a few years left to live.

Rather than becoming bitter, he began giving. He established philanthropic foundations and devoted himself to helping others. As his life became increasingly selfless, his health improved dramatically. Instead of dying in his forties, he lived into his nineties.

His legacy continues to impact generations. The lesson is simple:

Selflessness blesses both the giver and those around them.

Many people struggle because they approach life entirely from a selfish perspective. They focus only on what they lack. They rarely stop to thank God for what they already possess. Yet every day we enjoy gifts that money cannot buy:

- Life
- Breath
- Strength
- Protection
- Mercy

God has kept us. That alone deserves gratitude.

Relationships Should Not Be Transactional

Anything built entirely on transaction eventually loses its value. If someone claims to love you only because of what you can provide, be careful.

Real love values content more than container. Real love is interested in destiny. Real love is interested in purpose. Real love is concerned about your future.

People who genuinely care about you think beyond today's benefits. Those who focus only on immediate gain often have no intention of staying for the journey. The world has turned many relationships into business arrangements. Yet covenant relationships are built on sacrifice, commitment, and genuine concern.

Do Not Live Under Pressure

One of the greatest dangers facing this generation is unnecessary pressure. Social media has intensified comparison. People display lifestyles that create unrealistic expectations. Many young people are being pressured by images, possessions, and appearances.

Someone posts a car. Someone posts a house. Someone posts luxury.

And others begin questioning their own progress. Do not fall into that trap. Never allow someone else's display to make you despise your process. There are people whose achievements are genuine because everyone has witnessed their labour.

There are others whose stories are not as they appear. Stay focused on your journey. Do not measure your life by another person's highlights. When people boast about sinful achievements, boast in your righteousness. When people celebrate darkness, celebrate light.

Never be ashamed of serving God. Never be intimidated by your commitment to Christ.

Tell somebody:

"Be selfless."

One of the greatest expressions of selflessness is service. Service is proof of humility. Service reveals the condition of the heart.

Job 36:11 (KJV) says:

"If they obey and serve him, they shall spend their days in prosperity, and their years in pleasures."

Service to God is a covenant responsibility. Many believers desire sweetness in life while neglecting service. Yet Scripture shows us that the water became wine as it was being served. The sweetness appeared in the service.

Your sweetness is connected to your service.

Your increase is connected to your service.

Your honour is connected to your service.

Your advancement is connected to your service.

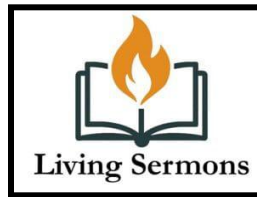
If you desire abundance, multiplication, favour, and distinction, learn to serve.

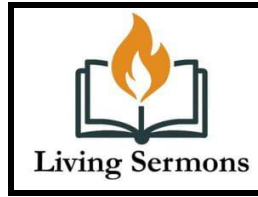

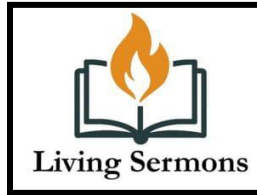
