Introduction

Give the Lord the praise as you receive His Word this morning. Thank You, Jesus. If that clap is for Jesus, make it bigger and louder! I can hear somebody with a shout of joy!

Thank You, Jesus.

Amen.

Heavenly Father, we thank You again for this very glorious morning — the first Hour of Visitation at Shiloh 2023. We know that You are already visiting us, and we give You all the glory and praise for it.

Lord, as Your Word comes to us as individuals, let each person encounter a visitation in Jesus' wonderful Name.

Amen.

Please get seated, and keep clapping for the Lord, everybody, to the glory and praise of His Name. Help me assure your neighbour this morning: *God will visit you.*

I count it a very great privilege again this morning, granted to me from God and from my spiritual father, our prophet and teacher. I pray that the existing unction on this altar is going to work wonders in somebody's life this morning.

Thank you very much, sir.

We are reminded this morning that our theme for Shiloh 2023 is:

“Redeemed to Flourish in Hard Times.”

Hard times have already commenced, and there is no prayer anybody can pray against it, because it is prophetic. You cannot pray against prophecy, but you can take a position as it applies to the fulfilment of the prophecy in your life.

For instance, Isaiah 60:2 says:

“For, behold, the darkness shall cover the earth, and gross darkness the people: but the LORD shall arise upon thee, and his glory shall be seen upon thee.”

That is a language — a word — of exemption.

There is darkness on one side and glory on the other side. So, do not worry about the darkness; look forward to the glory.

What did God say will happen to you?

The Lord shall arise upon you, and His glory shall be seen upon you.

When you see darkness, what do you expect? Glory!



Stewardship Secures Exemption in Hard Times

Our teaching this morning is captioned:

“Stewardship Secures Exemption in Hard Times.”

Addiction to serving God is our security in hard times. The harder it is, the more committed you should be.

Our text is Malachi 3:16–18, flowing into chapter 4:1–2.

“Then they that feared the LORD spake often one to another: and the LORD hearkened, and heard it, and a book of remembrance was written before him for them that feared the LORD, and that thought upon his name.

And they shall be mine, saith the LORD of hosts, in that day when I make up my jewels; and I will spare them, as a man spareth his own son that serveth him.

Then shall ye return, and discern between the righteous and the wicked, between him that serveth God and him that serveth him not.” — *Malachi 3:16–18*

In Scripture, fear is sometimes replaced by service.

Then they that serve the Lord spake often one to another, and the Lord hearkened and heard it. A book of remembrance was written before Him for them that serve the Lord and think upon His Name.

As a result of their service:

“They shall be mine...”

Serving God commits God to you. You become God’s property and responsibility when you serve Him.

“...in that day when I make up my jewels...”

You become precious jewels before the Lord.

“...and I will spare them...”

That means:

“I will separate them.”

“I will exempt them.”

Serving God is key to your exemption.

Inheritance and Rewards

The Scripture says:

“...as a man spareth his own son that serveth him.”

There are sons who are not serving, and there are sons who are serving.

When you become a child of God, you become entitled to inheritance. But when you serve God, you become entitled to rewards.

There is a difference between inheritance and rewards.

Inheritance is based on promises.

Rewards are covenant-based.

Promises may change, but covenant cannot change.

Many children of God are claiming promises, and to some extent God answers promises.
But He is committed to rewards. He cannot change covenant.

Nobody can alter your rewards.

You pray for promises, but you walk in covenant.

“He will spare his own sons that serve him.”

Then shall ye return and discern between the righteous and the wicked — between him that serveth God and him that serveth Him not.

The demarcation line is stewardship.

What separates us and distinguishes us is our commitment to serving God.

Hard Times Are Here — But So Is Exemption

Malachi 4:1 says:

“For, behold, the day cometh, that shall burn as an oven...”

That day has already started.

The world is already burning like an oven.

“...and all the proud, yea, and all that do wickedly, shall be stubble...”

Nobody can escape it.

But look at the good news in verse 2:

“But unto you that fear my name shall the Sun of righteousness arise with healing in his wings...”

He shall arise for you.

When others are sick, He will arise for you with healing in His wings.

“...and ye shall go forth, and grow up as calves of the stall.”

They will be going down; you will be going up.

They will be going backward; you will be going forward.

They will be begging; you will be giving.

They will be borrowing; you will be lending.

They will be selling houses; you will be buying them.

They will be searching for jobs; you will be employing them.

That is what God said about you in the covenant, and He shall not fail.

The subject we are considering this morning is about how to render service unto God and towards His Kingdom.

I heard God’s servant say yesterday:

“You don’t pray your way out of hard times; you learn your way out of it.”

There is always a way out.

1 Corinthians 10:13 makes us understand that God always makes a way of escape.

God’s people were troubled because there were no teaching priests among them until teachers of the Word emerged.

The verdict remains:

“My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge.” — *Hosea 4:6*

What you do not know is what Satan is using against you. Once knowledge is secured, hardship is terminated. As we go through this season of hard times, you will be riding on high. If that prayer is for someone, say loud Amen!

Biblical Examples of Exemption Through Service

From Scripture, we discover that all servants of God enjoyed exemption in hard times. Examples help us to understand, comprehend, and align with expectation. We have come to Shiloh not as a magical centre, but as a learning centre.

Do not come to Shiloh with the mindset:

“They will pray for me and things will happen.”

Come with the mind to learn.

Jesus said:

“Come unto me, and learn of me... and ye shall find rest unto your souls.” —
Matthew 11:29

Learning is key to taking our place at the top. What you learn today becomes an asset for your triumph tomorrow. I believe that as you receive this lesson this morning, God is going to change your position.

Daniel: A Servant Preserved

Daniel chapter 6:20–22 shows us how Daniel was exempted from destruction because of his commitment to service.

The king cried with a lamentable voice:

“O Daniel, servant of the living God...”

Somebody say with me:

“Servant of the living God.”

Daniel was known as a servant of the living God.

Who do people know you to be?

The king asked:

“Is thy God whom thou servest continually, able to deliver thee from the lions?”

We cannot change God’s ability, but we can activate His ability as we render service unto Him.

Daniel answered:

“My God hath sent his angel, and hath shut the lions’ mouths...”

For everyone serving God truly in hard times, God will shut the mouth of lions.

They will consume others, but they will refuse to touch you.

The hardship of this season will not touch you.

Poverty will not come near you.

Famine will not come near you.

Begging will not come near you.

Daniel 3:28 says:

“Blessed be the God of Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, who hath sent his angel, and delivered his servants...”

Servants are always delivered.

God cannot give up on servants because He needs their service.

These young men declared boldly:

“Our God whom we serve is able to deliver us...” — *Daniel 3:17*

They were sure they were serving Him.

How can you be serving God and not know?

If you are truly serving God, you will know.

God Bears Witness to His Servants

In Job 1:8, God Himself testified concerning Job:

“Hast thou considered my servant Job...?”

God is always proud of those who serve Him.

What is God saying about you?

Does He know you as one serving Him?

Even men will testify when you are serving God.

The king said:

“Thy God whom thou servest continually...”

There are three levels of witness available to those who truly serve God:

1. Your personal witness
2. God’s witness
3. The witness of men — including unbelievers

If unbelievers are not yet mocking you for serving God, perhaps you are yet to fully serve Him. But in the process of their mocking, God will be making you.

May you receive grace to serve Him more.

Hezekiah: Exempted from Untimely Death

The story of Hezekiah is another indication of a man who served God and was exempted from untimely death.

Isaiah came to him and said:

“Set thine house in order: for thou shalt die, and not live.” — *Isaiah 38:1*

But Hezekiah turned his face to God and prayed:

“Remember now, O LORD, I beseech thee, how I have walked before thee in truth and with a perfect heart...” — *Isaiah 38:3*

In essence, he said:

“I am Your servant. I cannot die anyhow.”

And God responded.

He told Isaiah:

“Go back.”

The programme had to be reviewed.

God added fifteen more years to Hezekiah’s life.

Serving God brings addition to life.

Serving God does not reduce people; it adds to them.

While others are dying, you will remain alive.

While others are in trouble, you will be rescuing them.

In the precious Name of Jesus Christ.

Job: Protected by Divine Hedge

Even the devil testified of God's covering around Job.

Job 1:9–10 says:

“Doth Job fear God for nought? Hast not thou made an hedge about him...?”

There is a divine hedge around those who serve God.

“...thou hast blessed the work of his hands, and his substance is increased in the land.”

Satan is a liar, but that day he told the truth.

When God blesses you overwhelmingly, even your enemies will testify of it.

That is what God will do for you in these hard times.

That is what your God, whom you serve, will do for you in this hard season.

Addiction to serving God is security to our lives in these hard times.

I declare, by the power of God at work on this altar, you will not suffer what they suffer.

I say, you will not suffer what they suffer.

“And ye shall serve the LORD your God, and he shall bless thy bread, and thy water; and I will take sickness away from the midst of thee.” — *Exodus 23:25*

Those who serve God do not struggle against sickness. God Himself said:

“I will take it away.”

Not only from you, but from your family — immediate and extended.

And it went further in verses 26 and 27:

“There shall nothing cast their young, nor be barren, in thy land: the number of thy days I will fulfil.”

What more?

“I will send my fear before thee...”

“...and I will destroy all the people to whom thou shalt come...”

“...and I will make all thine enemies turn their backs unto thee.”

Verse 28 says:

“And I will send hornets before thee...”

When you serve God, He takes over everything on your behalf comprehensively. He does not allow you to weep when others are weeping. He does not allow you to beg when others are begging. Those who serve God do not beg God; they simply enjoy His covering on every side. Everybody, please lift up your hand.

I decree that from today, whatever evil befalls others will jump over your house in the Name of Jesus.

Serving God Acceptably

We must come to the point of understanding that it is not enough to serve God; we must serve Him acceptably.

Hebrews 12:28 says:

“Wherefore we receiving a kingdom which cannot be moved, let us have grace, whereby we may serve God acceptably with reverence and godly fear.”

Grace comes by knowledge. In other words, let us learn how to do it. Acceptable service is what guarantees our exemption in hard times.

1. Serve Him Lovingly

How do you serve God acceptably?

You must serve Him lovingly. Our services are accepted when they are built on our love for God.

Deuteronomy 10:12 says:

“...to love him, and to serve the LORD thy God with all thy heart and with all thy soul.”

Again, Deuteronomy 11:13 repeats the same truth. You can be serving God without loving Him.

1 Corinthians 13:1–3 reveals this clearly.

Serving God without loving Him will soon make you weary. But loving Him enough to serve Him will keep you going all your life.

Without love, our service has no value.

Psalms 91:14 says:

“Because he hath set his love upon me, therefore will I deliver him...”

When others are going down, God says:

“I will set him on high.”

Why?

“Because he hath known my name.”

What God is looking for first is your love.

Before Jesus appointed Peter fully into service, He asked him repeatedly:

“Lovest thou me?” — *John 21:15-17*

Why?

Because love for God brings you into relationship with God, and relationship is what gives value to service. There are people serving God whom God does not know. Does He know you?

Are you walking with Him in love?

What gives value to your work for God is your walk with God.

Hezekiah said:

“I have walked before thee in truth...”

Then he added:

“...and have done that which is good in thy sight.”

He walked with God before he worked for God. Love for God is what gives value to our services in His Kingdom. And one thing about genuine love is this: it cannot be stopped.

Paul declared:

“Who shall separate us from the love of Christ?” — *Romans 8:35*

There are people who stop serving God when material rewards are delayed. But when you serve God out of love, you develop a spiritual umbilical cord that cannot be broken.

Song of Solomon 8:6 says:

“Love is strong as death.”

2. Serve Him Willingly

We must also serve Him willingly. Love for Him will make you look beyond whether rewards appear immediately or not. Even though rewards are certain, willingness keeps you eager and ready.

There are believers who must be pushed before they serve God. But willingness makes you self-motivated.

You are eager.

You are ready.

You are available.

Isaiah 1:19 says:

“If ye be willing and obedient, ye shall eat the good of the land.”

You can be obedient without being willing. But willingness is what guarantees enjoyment of the good of the land.

2 Corinthians 8:12 says:

“For if there be first a willing mind, it is accepted...”

The first thing God looks at is not merely your activity, but your willingness.

1 Corinthians 9:17 says:

“For if I do this thing willingly, I have a reward...”

Part of that reward is exemption in hard times.

3. Serve Him Dutifully and Faithfully

We must serve Him dutifully — faithfully. That means serving with a sense of commitment.

1 Corinthians 4:2 says:

“Moreover it is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful.”

Matthew 24:45–47 speaks of the faithful and wise servant whom the Lord finds doing His work when He returns.

Stewardship demands that you remain on duty.

Luke 19:13 says:

“Occupy till I come.”

Stay on duty until the Master returns. It is at your duty post that He locates you with rewards. Once you are off duty, you are off His covering, off His provision, and off His exemption.

Say with me:

“I will stay on duty.”

4. Serve Him Cheerfully

We must serve Him cheerfully.

Malachi 3:14 speaks of those who complained:

“It is vain to serve God...”

They served mourningly instead of cheerfully.

Cheerfulness gives you a place of exemption in hard times.

Serving God to the point that people begin to wonder whether you are truly affected by the same hardship around them.

Waking up in the morning cheerfully.

Serving in your service unit cheerfully.

Giving cheerfully.

Winning souls cheerfully.

Always smiling.

Always excited.

That is what God is looking for.

God loves a cheerful servant.

Even physically, people avoid those who constantly frown because expressions reveal intentions. Your cheerfulness expresses your willingness to serve God. God is looking for cheerful servants.

There are pastors who never smile on the altar. Members begin to whisper:

“Perhaps pastor has a problem. Shall we pray for him?”

Meanwhile, the one meant to help others is the one receiving intercession.

Serve Him cheerfully.

When I had only one pair of shoes — cheerfulness.

One coat — cheerfulness.

Sleeping on benches — cheerfulness.

Years later, when I shared those testimonies, people found it difficult to believe because whenever I appeared, it was always:

“Good morning, church! Everything is working! Let us give thanks to God!”

Cheerfulness.

Without cheerfulness, you cannot escape these hard times. Our cheerfulness attracts God, while constant sadness attracts Satan because he is a sadist.

Jesus said:

“In the world ye shall have tribulation: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world.” — *John 16:33*

Check your neighbour’s face. Is he smiling?

Tell somebody around you:

“Be careful!”

Deuteronomy 28:47–48 says:

“Because thou servedst not the LORD thy God with joyfulness, and with gladness of heart... therefore shalt thou serve thine enemies...”

Serve God joyfully.

You are in one room today? Keep serving God.

It will become two rooms.

It will become a duplex.

Do not serve God as though He is punishing you. If it appears painful now, He is only polishing you. Very shortly, the world will see you shining.

5. Serve Him Continually

The king said concerning Daniel:

“Is thy God whom thou servest continually able to deliver thee?”

Continually — not occasionally.

Daniel remained on duty continually, and therefore enjoyed divine exemption continually.

Galatians 6:9 says:

“And let us not be weary in well doing: for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not.”

1 Corinthians 15:58 says:

“Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye stedfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord...”

Do not count how long you have been serving.

Some people say:

“I have served God for twenty years and nothing is showing.”

No. Something is showing — you simply have not recognised what He has been doing.

Always abounding.

Why?

“...forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord.”

Say with me:

“I know my labour in Him is not in vain.”

Very shortly, it will show.

6. Serve Him Righteously

Finally, serve Him righteously. Do not mix ungodliness with service.

Isaiah 52:11 says:

“Touch no unclean thing..”

Only sanctified service is acceptable to God. You are bearing the vessels of the Lord, therefore be clean. May we all receive grace to serve Him righteously.

Last night, while laying the foundation for this prophetic event, God’s servant spoke extensively on sanctification, and I believe every one of us has received grace to live sanctified lives.

Platforms for Kingdom Stewardship

There are several platforms for rendering stewardship before the Lord.

The Altar of Prayer and Fasting

Praying for the advancement of the Kingdom.

Praying for souls to be saved and established.

Praying for neighbours.

Praying for pastors and ministers of the Gospel.

Colossians 4:12 tells us that Epaphras gave himself to prayer.

Luke 2:37 tells us that Anna served God with fasting and prayers.

Soul Winning and Establishment

You cannot be rescuing souls and become a victim of destruction. As you rescue people from destruction, God rescues you from destruction.

That is why Jesus commanded us repeatedly:

“Go.”

Matthew 28:18–20

Mark 16:15–20

Luke 14:21–23

John 4:35–36

Go.

Do not say:

“I do not know how to preach.”

The first time I went out to preach, I followed another believer. I memorised everything he said and thought I was ready.

At the next place, I told him:

“I will preach this time.”

Within one minute, all my message was finished.

But I thank God — I kept going.

Tell people what God has done for you.

You cannot rescue people and become a victim of destruction in these hard times.

You shall not be destroyed with them.

Giving and Caring for the Needy

Another platform is giving — beginning with tithing and caring for the needy. You cannot take care of the needy and end up needy yourself.

It is impossible.

As you engage these covenant forces, God will establish you in these hard times.

When others are falling, you will be rising.

When they fall, you will be raising them up.

God does not forget your labour of love.

He will surely reward you.



Closing Prayer

Please rise to your feet. Let us receive grace to serve Him more and to serve Him acceptably. Lift your voice and pray:

“Lord, I receive grace to serve You and to serve You with all my heart.
I receive grace to serve You as demanded in Scripture.”

Thank You, mighty Father. In Jesus’ wonderful Name we have prayed. Amen
