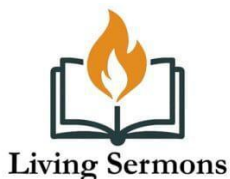
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Foreword

Opening and Prayer

Fire is not shouting fire. Fire is fire, and heavy is not shouting fire. Fire is authority. Fire is not wrong. Father, we thank You. We give You praise for this singles gathering. Thank You because You are gradually changing their story.

Lord, in the name of Jesus, in this short time that we are together, give us wisdom and divine direction. Let Your Word come with power and honour to take the glory. In Jesus' name we pray. Praise God.



Singles: Readiness for Marriage

“How many of you want to get married before Valentine next year?”

Raise your hand if you do.

For those who are not ready, please move to the back. If you are ready to marry within the next year, come to this side. If you are 27 or 28 and not ready, we need to pray for you. It is important to sit among those whose marriage desires align with yours. Your posture shows your readiness to act wisely.

My Heart is Not for Sale

Today, we will have a conversation on **love, value, and destiny**. You are not waiting to be chosen—you are preparing to choose wisely.

Say with me:

- “I am not waiting to be chosen.”
- “I am learning to choose wisely.”

This mindset will guide you to make the right preparations and choices in relationships.

Scripture Study

We will read from several scriptures to establish the principle that **people are not for sale.**

Genesis 31:15

“Are we not counted of him strangers, for he had sold us, and quite devoid also our money?”

Many people can be sold. When a man treats you as a stranger, he is placing a price on your life, your body, or your heart. **Say it aloud:** “My heart is not for sale.”

Isaiah 51:

Your sins can also sell you. When you live in sin, you give it permission to trade you.

Joel 3:3:

“...they sold a boy for a pair of shoes, they sold a girl for a bottle of wine...”

Do you see how literal the Bible is in showing the danger of being treated as a commodity? Betting on someone’s body is a reality—even spiritually. Say: **“My head is not for sale. My body is not for sale.”**

Amos 2:6:

“...they sell the righteous for silver, and the needy for a pair of sandals.”

Whenever relationships become a trading platform, **God is out.** When your emotions, your body, or your time are for sale, you are stepping outside God’s purpose.

Your Body: A Temple

1 Corinthians 6:19-20 (KJV):

“Know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you, which ye have of God, and ye are not your own? For ye are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God’s.”

God has already purchased you. Why should any man buy what God has already paid for? Sexual sin, trading, or using your body outside God’s plan violates the sacredness of the temple of the Holy Spirit.

Verse 18 (Amplified & MSG versions):

Flee from sexual immorality. Every other sin is external to the body, but immorality sins against your own body. Your body is sacred, a place for God-given love and union—not for exploitation or lust.

Say aloud: “My body is not for sale.”

Heart Matters: Proverbs 23:26

“Give me thine heart, my son, and let thine eyes observe my ways.”

God is contending for your heart. Your obedience and attentiveness to God reflect the value and destiny He has placed upon you. When you understand that **your heart, body, and life are not commodities**, you can prepare to choose wisely and honour God in every relationship.

The lady is contending for what God is contending for. When someone breaks your heart, understand why—your heart is in God’s hands. A man walking out of your life does not break your heart if it was given to God first. Give your heart to God before you enter any relationship, so that if a relationship ends, it does not destroy your spirit.

If your heart is in God’s hand, it cannot be broken. The one who left you simply was not fit for your future. Some may leave because of character misalignment, but God protects the hearts of His children.

The Art of the Heart

What is the art?

1. A gift from God
2. Designed for covenant
3. The centre of destiny
4. Not a tool for experiment

Say it aloud:

“My heart is a gift from God, designed for covenant, the centre of destiny, not a tool for experiment.”

When you understand the value of your heart, you can guide who is allowed space in it. Your heart is more than emotions—it is the centre of your destiny and calling. Let no one tamper with it, for heartbreak can destroy vision and purpose.

Your heart is a gift, not a tool. Do not use it to negotiate love, seek validation, or manipulate commitment. True commitment flows from **covenant**, not from emotional trading or self-compromise.

Do not allow gifts, presence, or attention to be reasons for giving your heart. Your word and value are established in Christ, not in the approval of others. Guard your heart carefully—do not do business with it before God does.

Covenant Over Culture

Genesis 2:24 teaches:

“Therefore shall a man leave his father and his mother, and shall cleave unto his wife: and they shall be one flesh.”

The biblical order is: leave your parents, cleave to your spouse, then become one flesh.

Culture has reversed this order: people find a partner first, begin sexual relationships, and then try to figure out commitment. Guard your heart, honour covenant, and follow God’s order.

Love does not equal access. Just because someone is present in your life or committed to your cause does not mean they have covenantal rights over your heart.

Many people compromise because of **unhealed wounds** and unaddressed needs—loneliness being a major factor.

Valentine’s Day or societal pressure should not dictate your decisions. True love and commitment are not tied to fleeting emotions or cultural expectations. Every day is an opportunity to love and honour God’s design for relationships.

As P. Daniel Olawande shares from personal experience, love in marriage is created and maintained through covenant, not feelings alone. Even when the emotional “gizg” fades, covenant responsibility remains.

Prayer and Prophetic Encouragement

The preacher prays over attendees:

- You will not miss your marital destiny.
- You will not marry a wicked person.
- God will scatter any potential wrong match.

He reminds believers not to make decisions from loneliness. Surround yourself with godly friends and mentors who can support, guide, and encourage your journey. Plan your future together with accountability and wisdom.

Avoid Emotional Decisions

It is not only men who may influence your heart. Do not make emotional decisions out of **loneliness, fear, or pressure**.

Fear might whisper, *“I am getting old,”* or *“All my friends are married; when will it be my turn?”* Remember, perfect love casts out fear. Where fear is, love cannot dwell.

Pressure can come from friends, social media, or societal expectations. Instead of letting it overwhelm you, convert it into **prophecy**: rejoice with those who are progressing, and declare your own season of blessing. Rejoice with those who are married, and tell yourself, *“Very soon, it will be my turn.”*

Healing Before Relationship

Do not enter a relationship to heal **emotional wounds**. Wounded people wound others. Heal yourself before giving love to someone else.

- Do not seek validation or affection to fill emptiness.
- Love yourself first; only then can you love another authentically.
- Correct wrong beliefs: you are **not incomplete** until you marry. God made you whole—one plus one becomes one, not half plus half.



Things People Trade Their Values For

1. **Money** – Trading integrity for provision God never withheld.
2. **Security and Shelter** – Choosing physical safety over spiritual wholeness.
3. **Emotional Comfort** – Using relationships to medicate rather than heal.

Do not compromise your heart for temporary gain. God can provide what you need without sacrificing your values.

Fear of losing a partner often leads to premature sexual intimacy. Remember:

- If a man cannot wait during courtship, he is not fit for your future.
- Premature sex does **not** secure a relationship; it can destroy your value and open the door for betrayal.
- Physical beauty alone cannot keep a partner; covenant and character maintain relationships.

Your presence, integrity, and the value you offer are far greater than your body. Let commitment flow from **covenant**, not from fear or manipulation.

Relationships and Compatibility

Unlike attracts. Extroverts may marry introverts; drivers may pair with passengers.

- P. Daniel Olawande shares his experience: his extroverted nature gradually blended with his wife's reserved personality. Mutual adaptation created balance.
- Do not expect your partner to mirror you exactly. Recognise complementary strengths and work together.
- Gentle or quiet men with vision are often overlooked, but they bring stability and purpose to a relationship.

Managing Personality Differences

- Keric or sanguine personalities must learn patience with flegmatic or melancholic partners.
- Suppression or insistence on having your way can create conflict. Learn to **align goals** and allow space for compromise.
- Marriage is about **partnership**, not dominance. Support, understanding, and vision alignment are essential for a thriving relationship.

There must be a **balance** in how you lead and interact with your partner. Flegmatic individuals may appear quiet, but they are firm in their ways.

- Lead gently and wisely; they will follow without feeling controlled.
- Study temperament and self-control—consider reading *Why You Act the Way You Do* by Tim LaHaye. Understanding personality differences equips you to navigate relationships without unnecessary conflict.

Broken Relationships and Repeating Patterns

Many trade their values because of past hurts.

- Do not compare your current partner to exes. Each person is unique.
- Avoid letting past relationship fears dictate your present. People who repeatedly project their heartbreak can prevent love from flourishing.
- Emotional decisions made in the shadow of past pain often lead to foolishness.

Foolishness and Lack of Wisdom

- Decisions made without counsel or discernment are dangerous.
- Seek guidance from trusted mentors, pastors, or leaders before entering relationships.
- Love can blind you; emotions can make wrong appear right and distort your reasoning.

Discernment in Courtship

- Observe actions carefully, not just words or sweet gestures.
- Seek external counsel: others can often see warning signs that your emotions obscure.
- Emotional manipulation, yelling, or controlling behaviour during courtship is a red flag.

Physical Attraction and Covenant

- Confusing **physical attraction** with covenant is a common trap.
- Beauty enhanced with makeup may be temporary; evaluate the natural person behind it.
- Real love transcends appearance. When you marry, life will bring changes—pregnancy, body changes, and ageing. True attraction goes beyond the superficial.

P. Daniel Olawande shares a personal story: on the day of his introduction to his wife, a fire accident covered her face. Despite this, he committed to love her beyond appearance, recognising her qualities, character, and spirit. This is the principle: **move beyond physical attraction** while appreciating it responsibly.

The Cost of Compromise

- Amos 2:6 reminds us that compromise is costly. Some sell bodies, time, purpose, or destiny.
- The currency of compromise may take many forms, but the cost is always too high.

“Don’t sell your body. Don’t sell your time. The price is too high; the cost is irrecoverable.”



Modern Lies in Relationships

1. **Sex will secure the relationship** – This is a lie. Premature sexual intimacy does not guarantee commitment. Those who leave may leave regardless. God honours integrity and covenant above physical intimacy.
2. **Romancing immorality** – Past sins or secrecy do not justify compromising your values.
 - Marriage is honourable; the marital bed is undefiled (Hebrews 13:4).
 - Sex is not a prerequisite for love or commitment. Even animals survive without constant sexual activity; how much more should God’s image-bearers exercise wisdom and self-control?

Romanticising immorality—playing around with it—is dangerous. Even when penetration is avoided, Scripture warns against lustful acts.

- Who told you that “it’s okay” because penetration did not happen?

- Dry humping or other intimate acts still carry consequences. Be careful of what you do with your past.

Some of us are not proud of our past. I wish I knew Jesus from birth. There are stories I don't like to share, memories I would rather forget. Especially as a lady, be careful how you treat your body. Men will always talk.

- Teach your daughters to **keep their body**.
- Christian brothers, avoid fornication and immorality. Run if necessary. The Holy Ghost will convict one day, and past actions may surface—even names may be remembered.

God has forgiven you, but men may not forget. Remember: old things have passed away in Christ, but your history may still be known externally.

“Anything you must sin to keep, you must continue sinning to sustain. God never builds destiny on compromise. What is built on sand cannot stand the storm of life.”

God's Pattern for Relationship

1. **Purpose** – Why are we coming together?
2. **Commitment** – Enter into mutual commitment after clarifying purpose.
3. **Covenant** – Marriage is the sacred covenant.
4. **Sex** – Intimacy aligns with purpose and covenant, not before.
5. **Voice** – Discuss shared goals and purpose, even after children.

Proverbs 4:23: *“Keep thy heart with all diligence; for out of it are the issues of life.”*

Your heart determines:

- The quality of your marriage
- Emotional health
- Spiritual authority
- Clarity about destiny

Guard your heart. Secure it. Don't allow unnecessary influences to shape your life.

Warning Signs in Relationships

1. **Secrecy** – Hiding your relationship signals shame, not love.
2. **Compromise** – Trading convictions for comfort is dangerous.
3. **Pressure** – Love never demands what covenant hasn't secured.
4. **Spiritual drift** – If your relationship pulls you away from God, run.
5. **Emotional drain** – Healthy love energises; toxic attachment depletes.

Singleness is not emptiness; it is preparation. It is a season for alignment, healing, growth, and clarity.

What Healthy Love Looks Like

- Respects boundaries; honours your “no” without resentment
- Encourages growth; celebrates purpose
- Prioritises obedience to God above feelings
- Patience without pressure or manipulation
- Accountability and transparency in community
- Moves intentionally toward covenant and marriage

Courtship is not “trying” a relationship—it is learning, aligning, and building intentionally. Involvement without clarity invites secrecy, confusion, and emotional risk.

Questions Before Saying Yes

1. Does this honour God?
2. Does it align with my future?
3. Can it stand in the light before spiritual mentors?
4. Is it building or breaking me spiritually and emotionally?

If the answer is “no” to any, the relationship is wrong.

God’s Perspective on Relationships

Malachi 2 reminds us: God is witness to relationships. Love is **covenant, not consumption**. Marriage is a sacred commitment, not a consumer experience.

“God is not casual about my relationship. I am the one that treats it casually.”

Declaration of Covenant

Say after me:

“My heart belongs to God. It is not for sale. I refuse pressure. I refuse fear. I refuse loneliness. As a decision-maker, I walk in wisdom. I walk in covenant. I honour the covenant. I preserve my destiny.”

One more time, say: "My heart belongs to God. It is not for sale. I refuse pressure, fear, and loneliness. As decision makers, I walk in wisdom. I honour covenant. I preserve my destiny."

Anytime you make a covenant, God is there. Are you following me? Never think it is casual. God is saying it.

So never make a commitment when you are not sure. God is there.

Do not trade purpose for attention.

Say, "I won't trade purpose for attention. Conviction for companionship. Destiny for temporary comfort. I will wait well. I choose well. I build well."

We are going to pray these four prayers together. Say: "Father, heal my wrong beliefs about love. Restore honour to my heart. Give me discipline and clarity. Lead me into purpose-aligned relationships."

Rise up on your feet. Let's pray together:

"Father, heal my wrong beliefs about love. Restore honour to my heart. Give me discipline and clarity. Lead me into purpose-aligned relationships in the name of Jesus. Refuse to journey with the wrong person."

Say, "I live lit. I build lit. I lead lit. I stay lit in the name of Jesus."

Living lit means living on purpose. Live on fire. Live aligned to your destiny. Build lit means I build structure around maintaining my fire. Lead lit means I lead others to stay a burning life.

As a single person, this should be your focus. We are starting a movement called Live Lit Lead. We are teaching people how to stay on fire 24/7 through the year—discipleship, practical teachings, living on fire in the workplace, marketplace, daily interactions, even without being in church. Fire becomes a lifestyle, not a cliché.

Stay lit. Build lit. Lead lit. Let your integrity, character, attitude, and excellence show. Stay lit under pressure. Say, "I choose to stay lit. This year, I live lit. I build lit. I lead lit."

Pray prophetically:

"Father, I will not miss my marital destiny. I will marry your best for my life. Scatter what I am not involved in. Keep my heart until you bring my choice. Lord, hand over the key to my choice, son or daughter."

Pray with revelation:

"Father, keep my heart until I meet my ordained choice. Give them the key. Protect my heart."

Pray for the right connection:

"Lord, order my steps into the right place, into the right meeting, into the right atmosphere where I will meet my choice. Connect us together. Lead us. Disconnect us from time wasters. I will not meet with those who waste my time."

Pray for attraction and alignment:

"Father, I become attractive to my God-ordained spouse. They will see me, love me. We will love each other. We will prosper, be healthy, blessed, mighty. I refuse the wrong family. I marry into the right family, right relationships."

Pray blessings for the future:

"I bless my future spouse. I bless every battle in their life and ours together. Remove sickness, delays, and weaknesses. My children will be healthy, intelligent, outstanding. We will live long and prosperous together. No delay. No burden. In Jesus' name, we are praying."

My wife will not be burdened. I will not be burdened. No delay. My children, they are sound. They are healthy. They will talk. They will hear. They will see. No autism, no Down syndrome, no sickness in their body.

My children, I bless you. You'll be mighty in Jesus' name. We pray.

One more prayer: speak prosperity into your future. Even if the person is poor, when you meet, prosperity will flow. I am not saying you should look for rich people, but money is an enabler of vision. If there is finance, there will be romance.

Love is an engine; marriage is an engine; money is the fuel. You might not accept it until you are married—you want to pay school fees, buy food, support your spouse, send

children to school. Are you following me? Bless the person you marry: money will flow into your hands.

Say, "I have money to be the head. I have what it takes to be the head in my house. Money will not finish in my house. We will have enough. Resources flow. Favor will jam. Favor overflowing blessings."

I am not saying despise a man because he doesn't have money yet, but ensure there is a covenant of prosperity in his life. Never marry a man who hates giving. Discuss giving before marriage; if he refuses, run. Giving is living.

One of the questions I asked my wife before marriage: "God can ask me to give all our savings in one day for His cause. What will you do?" She said, "I will support you." When God asked me to sell my car for a Congress, I did it. That's how she understood the giving covenant. Marry a man who believes in giving. Enter a prophetic prosperity covenant: we will not lack.

Say, "Father, with the person I marry, I enter a prosperity covenant. Prosperity will be our portion. No lack. We will not be poor. We will not be broke." Stretch forth your hands. I prophesy over you: you will not miss your marital destiny. You will not become a widow or widower. Your future is secure. Prosperity, good health, and children are your portion. No delay. As soon as you marry, your baby will come. God will prosper you, provide resources, and give you the best in-laws. His choice son or daughter will be yours.

Everyone trusting God to be married before February 14, supernaturally God will connect you. Your ears will hear clearly, and you will not miss it. In Jesus' name, we have prayed. Give God a shout of praise. Congratulate your neighbour: congratulations! Hallelujah. Praise God.

I'm enjoying my marriage. You will enjoy yours. Those close to us know we are not faking it. It is real. I wake up every day happy. My wife is fulfilling purpose; I am fulfilling purpose. You will enjoy peace.

If you are in a wrong relationship, I scatter it by fire. In Jesus' name, we pray.

Please sit down; few instructions and then we take one or two questions and close. How many of you feel this kind of meeting should be continuous? Not only February 14; this prayer should be continuous. I prayed it every day for five years on campus. We prayed it monthly in a meeting called Direction for Singles.

Simple wisdom:

1. Don't look for money first. Look for vision. Ensure the guy knows what he's doing and has a stable source of income. It's not about the amount, but the consistency of income.
2. The guy must have vision and planning. If you're not included in his plans, run away.

Any man who wants to put all financial responsibility on you is irresponsible. There must be consistent flow.

If you have questions, we take one or two.

First question: How to bring spiritual compatibility where both parties don't worship in the same ministry?

Answer: Have a conversation. Do you agree to submit to a spiritual mentor over this relationship? If yes, be accountable to that person. Agree together, then submit the relationship to him.

Next question: How to manage a long-distance relationship you are convinced about?

Answer: Long-distance can work with constant communication and accountability. There must be a timeline. A relationship without timing is a waste of time. Don't get married unless you are ready to have children. Trust God to provide. This counsel is from experience.

Next question: How to love a partner whose love language is shaped by past trauma?

Answer: Love people the way they want to be loved, not the way you think. My wife's love language is gifts; mine is words of affirmation. Respect and operate within your partner's love language. Even if it is not natural to you, honour it.



Understanding Love Languages in Marriage

The only gift that moves me is maybe a car, land, money, or gadgets. Those are the gifts that resonate. But you buy me frames or other things, they don't really enter into me. Maybe you bought me a new gadget, an updated version of my iPad, phone, or a new watch—those are the things that move me. Money, land, or a car—those are the gifts that really affect me. So, I prefer other means, but she wants to be buying me gifts all the time, and I don't always appreciate it.

Because she is a gift person, she wants to give gifts. After a while, she was not angry that I didn't appreciate the gift. It's not that I didn't appreciate it—it's just not my thing. Later, she understood that gift is not my primary love language, but she continues to give gifts because that's her way of expressing love.

I have come to respect her love language by also giving her gifts. In marriage, there must be compromise. I adjusted to her love language, started giving her gifts, and began appreciating the gifts she gave me—even though it's not my deepest preference.

It's more important to me that she engages with me, for example, asking how my Sunday sermon went. She knows I ask, "How was service today? Did I preach well?" It pains me when she doesn't follow a service because I know she is the only one who can give me honest feedback.

You love a lady the way she wants to be loved, not just the way you want to love her. After a while, if you do that consistently, you can gradually introduce other areas of expression.

Handling Misunderstandings in Relationships

Sometimes, you may unknowingly speak someone's love language and unintentionally mislead them. For example, when I was pastoring in VI LSC, a lady came to me saying, "Pastor, every Sunday you tell me I look beautiful, you compliment my dress, and now you've brought your wife to church."

Complimenting people is normal for me. I used to tell members, "You're looking nice, I like your hair," with no ulterior motive. But she misinterpreted it as romantic interest. When this happens, just apologize. Acknowledge that your intentions were pure and move on. You cannot control how someone perceives your actions.

Avoiding Dangerous Relationship Traps

1. Engaged Men

A question came in: "A guy told me he loves me but is engaged to his fiancée and promised to leave her for me. Should I wait?"

My answer: He is engaged—why would you want someone else's relationship to break because of you? That is a red flag. Never journey with a man avoiding accountability. If he breaks up later and God ordains him for you, that's different, but don't start there.

2. Perverse Interests

If the guy you love has interests like BDSM, understand that this is a perversion. Such habits, influenced by pornography and immoral exposure, are dangerous in marriage. Avoid it completely.

Visibility and Attractiveness for Singles

A single lady of 25 asked why no guy has approached her in a year. Some reasons:

1. **Not Approachable** – Your demeanor or availability may unintentionally repel attention.
2. **Not Visible** – Some ladies are offline or rarely share their presence. You must be visible in positive, intelligent ways. Post on social media, engage, let people see your personality and intellect.

Dress well, maintain good hygiene, and carry yourself with dignity. Serve and participate in gatherings, both in-person and online. Intelligent engagement, like commenting on posts, creates opportunities for connections.

Dealing with “Nice Guys” and Canopy Brothers

Another question: “I’m close to a guy who likes me but hasn’t asked me out in almost a year, and it’s affecting my mental health.”

Advice: Nice guys who linger without clarity are dangerous for single ladies—they are canopy brothers. Ask clearly, “What are we doing?” If he avoids commitment, move on. Never wait indefinitely for someone who won’t take initiative.

Closing Prayer and Blessing

Father, we thank You for today. We give You all the praise for this service. Lord, I pray for these amazing sisters and brothers. Settle them in the name of Jesus. Make their journey smooth as they go back home. May we hear testimonies of breakthroughs, supernatural settlement, and divine guidance. In Jesus’ name, Amen.
